Year R Term 6 2023

Welcome back everyone. We hope you enjoyed a fantastic half-term break and are looking forward to a brilliant final term in Year R. This newsletter will give you a brief overview of what your child will be covering up until the summer holidays.


<u>Literacy</u>

We will be story writing this term based on the story 'Ruby's worry'. We will be linking this theme to the idea of being ready to move to Year 1.

Maths

This term we will be focusing on the following:

Sharing amounts of objects equally into groups

We have moved on to Phase 4 of phonics. This phase does not introduce any new sounds, but introduces consonant clusters at the beginning and ending of words (such as 'frowning'). We have already started reading tricky words for this phase (see above) and some children have started to learn how to spell these words too!

- Using doubles when sharing
- Recognising odd and even numbers
- Mapping and describing positions
- Consolidating understanding of more than, less than, equal.
- How to find out a hidden number by adding or taking away

We are still practising counting backwards as this is **still** an area of maths that many of us are finding difficult (15 and 13 seem to catch us out).

Topic

This term we will be learning about where we live and we will be using our geography and history skills. We will be using maps of the local area to find out where our school is situated within the village. We would like the children to learn their address (number of house and street they live in). We will also explore the idea of what school was like a long time ago, starting with the Manor Primary School and how the original school is now used by the local pre-school. We are asking children to ask the oldest member of the family (or family friend) what their experience of school was like when they were young (this is our home learning challenge for term 6).
